

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


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Missionary LIGHT, Let It Shine

Novitiate Year

here is seldom a temptation in every religious (man or woman) to get scared or rightly so to develop

I unprecedented skepticism of the idea of detachment held so tightly in the novitiate. This is normal; if you ask me although, the understanding of it changes once the novitiate is done. It is an experience which occurs once in a vocational journey involving a single religious institution. I always questioned the fact that every religious I met, alluded to the fact that they enjoyed the novitiate. This is especially when I first arrived in the Divine Word Novitiate in Zambia and was separated by all means to anything which will or would have purchased my attention away from personal reflection.

Then came the "Eureka" moment for me when I realized that it is in the detachment and more time for the self that every religious was justified to state boldly that they enjoyed their novitiate.

From another dimension, there is a temptation to think that the novitiate is a non-pleasant experience that needs to be undertaken as part of formation and not formation in itself. This would mean that the novitiate would be a means to an end and not an end in itself- the consequence will be the statement "I never enjoyed my novitiate". It would not be easy in the beginning because of what a person is used to, but with time everyone finds a serene environment to develop an experience that will be told of even in the future. Our Novice Director will be right to remind us that sometimes "we have to unlearn what we have learnt before we can learn new things" that we can call formation.

In a world in which there is too much rush, noise, confusion, and misunderstanding, it is almost impossible to find time for oneself. The canonical year is done in seclusion to provide for us time to reflect on our vocation and clarify and mature it in accord with the will of God.

The seclusion in the novitiate, though, is not in the absolute sense as is the case in the prison. Our schedule is flexible to avoid the laxity that might develop out of not engaging with people for a long time. Thus, as much as we need to be within the four walls of the novitiate for the whole year, we often get time to go out for various activities like sports, masses, diocesan activities etc. The best experience in the novitiate can only be told in the most perfect way by the individual because everyone develops an experience through the programmes offered here. I always think of how religious life would have been without the novitiate, it would have been like studying scripture without ever opening the bible or like claiming to be a footballer without ever getting in a football pitch, call it potes sem!

(SVD LAYPARTNERS)

n the observation of the Zambia Mission since his arrival almost a year ago, Fr. George Clement Angmor, SVD, the Novice Master began taking several initiatives both in the novitiate community and the mission at large. The recent of these is the organization of the Friends of the Novitiate (FoN) which would be inaugurated into the SVD Lay Partners (SVDLP) in Kabwe, in the Catholic Diocese Kabwe of Zambia. This is the first in the diocese and second in the Zambia mission, following the premier group in the Holy Family Parish of Linda in the capital city of Lusaka, established by Fr. Lawrence Likulano, SVD, Parish Priest and also, the Mission Secretary.

The first meeting took place on Saturday, 21st May, 2022, at the Divine Word Novitiate at Dallas, a suburb of Kabwe. A total number of twelve people were in attendance for the programme out of the earlier enlisted sixteen people, with two excused on travels.

As part of the programme, the novices made some Power Point presentations. Fraters Appiah Samuel started with a presentation on Who are the Divine Word Missionaries?, followed by Nyabwari Ombuna Cosmas, who presented on Who are the SVD Lay Partners?, and concluding the presentations was What is the novitiate? by Matiwaza Hanani. As part of the presentations, some video clips from the SVD lay partners around the globe were shown. This gave them more ideas on what SVD lay partners are doing and where to possibly start from.

Fr. George announced that the group would be inaugurated on 17th July, 2022, the upcoming day of the profession of first vows of the novices.

Out of those present for this first meeting, four were nominated

as interim executives. They are: Mrs. Chileshe Ndalia (Chairperson), Mr. Mike Munyama (Secretary), Ms. Julian Kwara Kambole (Financial Secretary), and Mrs. Mwansa Nyirongo (Publicity Officer)

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The following materials/hand-outs were given to them: Statutes of SVD friends in Zambia, Who are the Divine Word Missionaries (SVD?, and A Bouquet of Prayers (a leaflet of prayers).

The programme lasted two and a half hours, and came to an end with the praying of Vespers (Evening Prayers) and having supper together, with some more socialization before departure.

Let your light BY: Lunga Busani shine as a religious

wiseman once said, "You can be happy only if you realize that it is not your position that matters in life but your disposition." I agree with him, however, I want to modify this adage to the context of religious life in the way I see it: that, your light will shine as a religious if only you realize that it is not your position or status that matters but your disposition to the mission and the world. Three paramount points can be drawn from this modified adage, that is action, contentment and happiness. I am convinced that the religious who incorporates these three aspects in their lives, do become shining lights for the people. I term it the "give and get" principle of life. What one gives and is satisfied with to his vocation is proportionate to what one gets in return. If one gives into worry, jealousy, suspicion and discontentment, one will get back unhappiness and misery which in turn would dim one's light and therefore affecting those who are in great need of the light.

I am reminded of a conversation I had lately with one of my brother novices about Elon Musk, the world's richest man on buying twitter, a social media application. Jokingly he asked me "it is good to dream and wish: do you not wish to be wealthy like Elon Musk?" Jokingly I replied, "No I do not wish to become like him, however, I wish to become a good religious". This took me back to some of my philosophy mates, who more often than not would envy their age mates who were into other professions, reaching the extent of feeling uncomfortable of wearing their habits with the fear of identification. I believe they were discontent with their choice when leveling the scales of life although they had secret love for those choices.

Happiness and contentment are the foundation of a happy vocation as well as for a brighter light.

It is apparent then, that light shines not for itself but for others to see clearly, and so is a religious, not a religious for him/herself but for the world. Thus, the surest way that one's light shines brighter is to first appreciate and be content with one's vocation. Second, it is to widen the circles of friendship and to love all people. Third, it is to widen one's service, time and smile at the same moment widening the spheres of activity wherever one finds his or herself. Finally, one has to live everyday with its good and bad experiences; in such a way that one enjoys every moment and those short-term successes one encounters, while praying to achieve the longterm ones. In a world marred with so much darkness in form of massacres, exploitation of the poor by the rich, suicides etc. One's light can bring comfort to it and dispel this darkness.

In conclusion, one has to make God one's copartner in his of her life. To ask Him for the virtue of patience, that will feed one with life giving strength to persevere all the storms that he or she might face, and so brighten the world in an even more powerful way. BY: Appiah Samuel

These cultural activities were portrayed through their dressings, dances, recitations, songs, PowerPoint presentations and a variety of dishes from the above mentioned countries were also displayed and enjoyed by all.

> Some couples and friends around us in Kabwe were invited to grace the occasion. Some religious: Little Servants of Mary Immaculate (LSMI) and SVD confreres in the town were not left out to enjoy the occasion.

The celebration was purposely to have an interaction with other families and friends by way of presenting who we are culturally and as Divine Word Missionaries (SVD). Furthermore, to understand what families or people expect of the priests, religious, novices and seminarians in general.

EXPECTATIONS

Many questions were answered at the end of our display and presentations. The guests made known of their expectations as they also encouraged and motivated us in our vocational journey.



They stated that they expect us to be loyal, humble and most importantly prayerful (cf. 2 Chronicles 7:14). Again, they added that, we are expected to be each other's keeper with good community lifestyle and bury our personal interests. We should be sociable especially to the youth and live exemplary lives to attract them into the religious life.

We were also advised to avoid what they termed as '3 Ws' (Wealth, Wine, and Women).

Thus, based on the vow of poverty, we are to live simple but good lifestyle and should not be engaged in craving for wealth and money (cf. Proverbs 22:1). We are the light to others and role model in society, therefore, we should consider where and how to take alcohol and reduce its intake (Galatians 5:19-21). Also with respect to the vow of chastity, we are only to have a healthy relationship with women/ladies (cf. Hebrews 13:4/1Corinthians 6:18-20).

On the other hand, we were encouraged to cherish our vocation and always respond to God's call.We were advised that, the world is full of enticement and this can sometimes distract our focus, but "keep the zeal of continuity and focus solely on Jesus Christ, the Light of the world. You will encounter struggles and temptations but be steadfast and persevere. God who has called you will be with you always" (cf. 1 Thessalonians 5:24) they assured us.

After vespers (evening prayers), the intercultural/country meal prepared by the novices were enjoyed by all. The day which started at 15:00 hours came to an end around 18:30 hours.

Culture & Scriptures



ADINKRA SYMBOLS FROM GHANA

In the Akan language (Twi), Adinkra means "saying goodbye" to one another when parting. The name Adinkra, according to an Asante/Ashante legend, come from the Bono King of Gyaman (Nana Kofi Adinkra). He was defeated and captured in battle by the Ashante people. Nana Adinkra wore cloth with patterns of symbols, as an expression of sadness and departing. traditional symbols (ADINKRA) onto funeral cloths as a way of saying goodbye to the dead. Such cloths are now used for many different occasions to enhance the beauty of the cloth and to convey a proverbial message.

Today, the Adinkra cloth is not exclusively worn by the Ashante people. It is worn by other ethnic groups in Ghana on a variety of social gatherings and festive occasions.

In the 1800s, the Ashantes began to paint

SOME ADINKRA SYMBOLS AND THEIR MEANING

GYE NYAME - Except for God

This symbol symbolizes God's power through the knowledge that people should not fear anything except for God. The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom (*Prov. 9:10*)

(Prov. 9:10) It also connotes that, no one has seen the beginning of all creations, nor will anyone live to see the end, except for God.

He is the ALPA and OMEGA, ... (Rev. 22:13)



MATI MASIE - I have heard and kept it

It represents four linked ears, which serves to remind people of the importance of listening and acting on it.Be doers of the Word, not mere listeners...

Symbol of WISDOM AND PRUDENCE


SANKOFA – Return and get it

Revisiting our cultural values after slavery just like the Israelites. ... Ask for the Ancient path where the good way is and follow it... (Jer. 1:16)



Josepha, Hendrina ARE Stenmanns, as a female Religious-missionary congregation THE dedicated to the life-giving Spirit. They have about 3,000 SSpS members working in 46 different countries.

From different parts of the world they share their lives in ministries ? such as: Pastoral and Catechetical, Social Services, Education, Health, Administration, any apostolate with the need of time. In Zambia, they work in the dioceses of Livingstone and Kabwe.

e had a chance to have an interaction with a young Fidei Donum lay missionary, Magdalena Mika, a Polish missionary in Kabwe, Zambia. She was invited to our novitiate to share with us some of her experiences as a lay missionary. She has worked in Zambia for over seven years. According to Magdalena Mika, "Happiness is choosing" she continued, "You have to be happy with what you do." From infancy, she was inspired by her uncle who was a missionary-priest in Madagascar, she always wished to be a missionary in Africa as well. For



Magdalena, that made her to study hard so that she couldbe a wellequipped missionary. After completing high school, she came to Zambia as a volunteer in Livingstone, and worked with orphans and street kids for one year. Later on, she had a strong love for the missionary work and decided to come back as a lay missionary, Fidei Donum.

Her dream came true, today she is a missionary here in Kabwe. As a psychologist she does counseling, assists the poor, the marginalized and people with disabilities in their homes. A question was asked: 'How do you get financial assistance to facilitate your missionary life since you are not supported by the diocese?' Her response was that the people from her parish in Poland, diocese, family, friends and other anonymous benefactors assist her in her missionary task. We were inspired by her dedication to learn the Bemba language. The language helps her to communicate easily with those who cannot speak English. She advised us that, language is the first thing to

quickly grasp so that it becomes easy to do evangelization in the mission.

One of the lessons she shared with us and we felt encouraged was that, as a missionary one should try as much as possible to acquire basic skills in woodwork, metalwork, building, first aid, etcetera. I was touched by this as during the time of our founder (St. Arnold Janssen he emphasized strongly on this to the first missionaries in the Society of the Divine Word (SVD). She encouraged multi-tasking for a religious-missionary since it will help to enrich one's missionary life wherever one finds himself. It was an inspiration to us and it made us feel more and more the need to embrace religious missionary life as we saw the passion and happiness which Magdalena has put in her daily missionary tasks to help the people of God here in Zambia.

30 Days Journey

This sort of journey with Jesus is a deeply spiritual as well as a side-by-side walk in solitude. We began the journey on Saturday 5th March, 2022 with Jesus in our "wilderness" led and guided by Rev. Fr. Gabriel Šosu, SVD. We travelled with God to the top of the mountain; Prayer, we walked with Him along the road; Meditation, had a series of encounter through the Mass and exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, and heard that still small voice of the Lord in silence, in the silence of our hearts.

Prior to the beginning of the journey, we were admonished to carry nothing but the following; Bible, Rosary and Silence.We were told it was going to be a twenty-four hour prayer and absolute silence with fasting. The very essence of this journey was striving for holiness, and to draw closer to the Lord.

Within the thirty days, some topics elucidated on included but not limited to: My God loves me, Faith, Discipleship, Sin, Prayer, Leadership, Forgiveness, Chastity, Holy Spirit the dynamic force in our Lives... in all, we dealt with twenty-nine topics. At the end of each topic, we were given five scripture texts for prayer and meditation. We also had to prepare reflections on the scripture texts and meet the retreat director at an appointed time individually.

Holy Mass was celebrated each day at noon and after vespers (evening prayers) the Blessed Sacrament was exposed for adoration.

AT THE OASIS

A journey in the wilderness will certainly make one weary, thirsty, tired... It was in view of this that on the 19th, when we got to the oasis, we were allowed to take a rest; we could at least break the silence for a day in order to pass some vital communication.

SOME EXPERIENCES

There were but brief and transitory moments when the soul touches God, and this comes with such an indescribable joy.

There was that serene peace of the heart and soul. Peace of the body is well-ordered harmony of all its parts, peace of the irrational soul is the orderly repose of the senses and peace of the rational soul is the harmony between thought and action.

If only we would permit the Word of God and the Holy Spirit to penetrate our hearts, we can proclaim like Jesus, and attest to the truth that we do not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.

It was spiritually refreshing and renewing. We had enough time to focus on our inner values and vocation.

A TIME OF REST AND REPAIR

Making a little paradigm shift from the spiritual to the physical. Taking the entire canonical year into perspective and considering the activities of the novitiate especially on the aspect of work. Most brothers were in fact tired and getting worn-out each passing day. This period was also an opportune time to rebuild, grow and repair worn-out tissues, restore certain organs and rest for the entire body.

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A SUDDEN CHANGE

Having anticipated of being guided to the end by the retreat director, Fr. Gabriel, there happened to be a change of event after twenty-one days of our journey with him. Due to some issues regarding his visa, it could not permit him to renew it or stay longer, so on the 27th March, 2022, he returned to Zimbabwe. He gave us the rest of the bible texts for the remaining days for our meditation and personal reflection. From this time onward, we were left under the complete guidance of the Holy Spirit through the Ignatian Spirituality at the end of which we reviewed our days with the director of novices.

CONCLUSION

Indeed, it was a great moment; a period of intimate communion with the Divine and of love. A moment when most things of the physical were despised, eliminating distance,

paying less attention to the usual activities, living in moderation and focusing on the Lord in prayer. How we wished not to leave this ambiance of solitude, purity and prayer. Like the prophet Isaiah, we can say; the Spirit of the Lord is upon us (cf. 61:1).

We will like to use this opportunity to encourage all and sundry to make it a point to embark on such journeys, even if it is a day or two. It will be helpful both spiritually and physically.

We got to our final destination and ended the journey on 4th April, 2022 with a thanksgiving Mass. To God be the greatest glory.

We acknowledge and thank all confreres especially our retreat director, religious men and women, our collaborators of the Novitiate community, relatives and loved ones, who supported us in diverse ways during this essential spiritual exercise in our religious life. God bless us all.
